Topics:

- 1) 40th Anniversary: Suggested fee to hold event at Thacher was discussed as well as other venues. The NCC will earmark funds in the 2018 budget to provide financial support for the event.
- 2) Thom: should we ban a Special Use group for violating rules? Board discussion supported manager and Vice President will write a letter to offending group with input from manager.
- 3) Barn Dance: E. Davis thanked board for support; confirmed helpers for setup/teardown at event but could use a few more; food, raffle items/prizes all on track. Emily indicated she would like to step down as chair of this committee after next year, the event's 10th anniversary.

Primary issue is notifying parents of minors visiting caves as a member of a Special Use Group. Board consensus focused on camp leaders verifying they have advised parents of risk statement approved by our attorney. Issue to be addressed again before 2018 caving season.

The Investment Committee is established as a permanent committee assigned to the Treasurer's Department. The Committee is responsible for directing the investments of the Northeastern Cave Conservancy, Inc. and those investments shall be collectively referred to as the Portfolio. The Committee shall report any substantive changes to the Portfolio to the Treasurer for inclusion in the Treasurer's quarterly reports, to include an annual summary of the Portfolio for the December annual meeting.

at the Spring and Fall NRO thanks to our auctioneers Alan Traino and to all who ners and organizers. We tried at Spring NRO by placing

much of the lesser value items on a table with a donation jar which worked quite well and allowed us to focus on the better items for the auction. We also gained a few new members and renewals at both events.

- 2. Work obligations kept me from attending OTR as planned.
- 3.NCC/CCG work day at Tory's Cave to clean our sinkhole in preparation for installation of a cave gate.
- 4.NCC/CCG trip to to install light data loggers to monitor visitation over the winter months for the owners as a follow up to the Acquisitions Committee visit earlier this year.

President's position still needs to be filled, advertising has been placed. To date we have had one inquiry.

CAVE PRESERVE REPORTS:

1. Bensons (Luke Mazza)

Progress: Visited the property on 8/11 and mowed the right of way which was starting to resemble a field. The trail was walked as well as some of the rest of the parcel. The preserve was noted to be in good shape.

4 permits were issued since the last report in June and 2 of those were not actually used that I'm aware of. I expect at least a couple more trips to Bensons before the close of the caving season.

Issues: Removing the bagged trash from the spring sinkhole cleanup is an outstanding task that I intend to take care of before the end of Fall 2017 once I coordinate the right vehicle and preferably one or two volunteers.

Plans: Currently targeting October 7th for the removal of the bags of trash. If anyone is interested in joining let me know. This task should be made easier by the fact that MOSA (the dump) is right around the corner.

2. Bentleys (Devon Hedges)

A good many trail work days, majority of trail is widened to match the lower sections; roughly 5-7' wide. Lots of Stinging Nettle cleared a overhanging or fallen, but still attached branches cleared.

Constructed a primitive wood raft from fallen branches to cover an upper, wet trail section seems promising. Not a lot of nearby rock comparatively, so branches being lighter makes for a better plan.

Fall work will likely include improving the corduroy/raft, maybe constructing some rock cairns to make way finding easier in some sections without conspicuous trees to fix trail markers on. These cairns could be built up over time by future visitors/work parties to make for semi-permanent markers for when undergrowth gets high. Brochure bin is needed for kiosk. A new sign for the preserve is needed as the old is water damaged though no clear sign of ongoing roof problems. A sign without Jay Spivak's personal email on it would be good, I'd think.

Nothing notable in- the cave other than some trash pickup. During a guided trip for about six visitors during Fall NRO, a young family, recently having visited Clarksville Caves (Ward's section), wanted to give it a go. Got flustered at getting belly-down in cold water. Lots of logged visitors, though; I can get a more accurate count of that and my number of visits if anyone likes.

3. Clarksville (Thom Engel)

There were reports of garbage being dumped in the lower parking area. One of the special use groups picked it all up. There are also reports of graffiti in the cave. RPI Outing Club has offered to clean it up.



4. Ella Armstrong (Alan Traino)

No report.

5. Knox (Mitch Berger)

Progress: Trail maintenance, and a perimeter check have happened; no signs of trouble. Issued 19 permits since the last report; the early part of the season was atypically slow, but visitation surged in September.

Issues: The launch of the new website (followed by a postal mailing about it) caused many people to be misinformed about the permit requirement, start sending in ancient trip release forms, etc. Very few people seem to have taken brochures. There's still a rope at the Great Divide of unknown age/origin. There's a bunch of poison ivy, and possibly poison parsnip along the trail.

Plans: Post the annual closure signs. Periodic property inspection. Possible graffiti removal in Knox, and investigation of methods. Addition of trail markers and re-posting of property. Boundary marking. Removal of the Great Divide rope. Investigation of trouble-some plant species.

6. Merlins (Morgan Ingalls & Jacob Morris-Siegel)

Problems- None

Progress- It was a quiet summer at Merlins. We had two trips to the cave this quarter, both of which were during NROs. Work also continued on the Dome 12 dig, and will likely continue this fall.

Plans- The parking area needs to be cleared as it currently has a lot of vegetation. Similarly, the loop trail should be walked and the trail markers need to be checked. A Steward Leader Training should be planned for next summer. The cave will be closed for the season October 1st.

7. Onesquethaw (Thom Engel)

Number of permitted trips so far this year is 20 with a mean group size of 5.2.

Risk Management (Mitch Berger)

Progress: Switched our General Liability insurance coverage to the Conserve-A-Nation program (and saved a lot of money). Obtained Director's & Officer's insurance coverage. Attended and participated in the Cave Conservancies Roundtable at the NSS annual Convention.

Issues: Investigating a question about the Fiduciary Liability section of our D&O insurance.

Plans: Work on our Terrafirma renewal after December 1. Assemble the rest of the Committee membership. Pick up other issues that were in-progress with the former ad-hoc committee.

Torys Ad hoc committee (Bob Simmons)

Assisted the WHLT with a sinkhole cleanup project on August 31. Chris Sanders came in two days later and constructed a bat gate over the main entrance to the cave to complete the gating of the cave as a possible recovery site, post WNS. Gating funds were ob-

tained from USFWS through CT DEEP to WHLT. NCC/CCG labor and mileage used as part of matching grant funding. Next step will be to rewrite the management plan for the cave in conjunction with WHLT staff, now that a number of the recommendations/ unknowns have been addressed from the initial MP.

40th Anniversary Ad hoc committee (Alan Traino)

Bat Hibernation Ad hoc committee (Emily Davis & Mike Warner)

Progress: None

Problems: Spoke to Fish and Wildlife Service rep in January. He had a plan that would probably allow us to open Onesquethaw but he did not follow through with the work needed to do so.

Plans: Start now to work with him and with Carl Herzog to do the survey work required to get the FS to allow us to open the cave. We are still looking for someone to take over the committee that can work with intricate interagency regulations.

Special Use (Thom Engel)

So far this year, I have received a total of 199 reservations. Of this, about 62% are for the months of July and August. Over 82% of those were for Clarksville.

Not counting requests for access during closure, I have denied 11 permits this year. One of these groups came anyway. They claimed they didn't receive my e-mail upholding the denial. This is a group we see once a year. I would like to tell them they are not welcome until the 2020 season. (That seems like a long time, but since they visit once per year, this would only be 2 visits: 2018 and 2019.) I would like a sense of the board on this.

Some groups, due to past problems, are designated as having to submit waivers before being permitted. I have removed this designation for 3 of these groups.

The Boy Scouts have changed their caving rules. They have increased allowable group size from 12 to 14. They allow anyone old enough to be a Boy Scout "to enter easily accessible, non-technical/non-vertical, wild caves." However, they have made equipment rules more stringent. And they have made qualification for trip leaders clearer (and as I read them, more stringent.) "For trips to non-vertical caves, there must be one Qualified Trip Leader, at least 21 years of age, and one additional Trip Leader, that is at least 16 years of age. Qualified Trip Leaders must have recent and ongoing caving experience and preferably be a member of the NSS or equivalent. They must be proficient in all necessary established safety practices including cave rescue, and must also understand conservation measures, courtesy to cave owners, and any current environmental concerns for that caving area. The Qualified Trip Leader must be very familiar with the cave to be visited." It is unclear how this will affect the amount of BSA caving, but if groups strictly adhere to the equipment requirements troops might be hard put to actually run a caving trip.

So far this year I have dealt with over 250 e-mails regarding special use. (I have decided to start tracking this number because it gives a better idea of the workload beyond just the number of reservations.)

Surprise Cave Committee (Al DeMaria/Bob Simmons)

Very little activity this quarter; did a call with Carl Herzog from NY DEC concerning the possibility of doing a joint investigation with NCC (under our Stewardship Permit) to assess the reported temperature increases in the cave. Recent data suggests cave has gotten warmer to the point of being near the higher range of acceptable temperatures for hibernating bats in the region. Project would consist of documenting temperature conditions in cave and then assessing the possibility of opening older/additional entrances into the cave to allow for more cold air to enter and settle in cave over winters. Have communicated to owner of rest of cave and discussed recollections of older entrances to cave, at least one of which would NOT be on state property.


Thacher Park (Thom Engel)

We had three sessions scheduled this year. In addition, groups could do surveying in Hailes if the required lead time was given to the park. Regarding the sessions, the first date had truly lousy weather and nothing was done. On the second date the weather was better and some surface work was done. We found a deep grike. High water in Hailes prevented any new mapping. On the date, no one showed up except me.

Only one group took advantage of surveying in Hailes on other dates. The resurvey of the cave from the entrance to "Farthest West" was started. 460 feet of passage was surveyed

I would really like to hand the whole site over to a new webmaster -- someone with more time and love to give to it -- but at the moment most of the likely candidates in the immediate pool (myself, Luke, Seth) all have just had a second baby or are about to. Anyone have any other suggestions for people that could/would do it?

The volunteer value form is the current hot item; I will try to get that working better. It is built off a pre-built plugin (which isn't as flexible as my handwritten code), so some of the things will likely not be the same as before.

Volunteer Value Committee – Vince Kappler:

Progress: Year to date totals: 1395 hours of volunteer work for NCC projects for a total value of \$40,318.00. Members also reported traveling 4696 miles to work on NCC projects.

Agenda items were arranged to accommodate members on the conference call.

- 1. Potential President: Young will invite the applicant to the September meeting to meet the board. Board members should review applicant's resume and cover letter prior to the meeting.
- 2. Officer Reviews: Officer reviews are scheduled for the September meeting. A straw poll will be taken to determine if the board would like to meet at 9 AM, in closed session, to conduct the reviews. Ideally, we can schedule 20 minutes for each officer. Alternatively, we can meet at 10 AM, conduct the reviews and begin the regular meeting at 11. We would advertise the "open" meeting as beginning at 11. Young will circulate a list of review questions to the Trustees. Note to EC: Thom may have locked us in to a 10:00 AM start time, will need to confirm before we offer a 9:00 AM slot for reviews.
- 3. Endowment Fund: Young recommends the NCC consider establishing an endowment fund to generate income to support the operation of the conservancy. A financial advisor has offered to speak to the board on the topic. EC consensus was that the spring meeting would be the best time.
- 4. NSF Contract: National and international caver events have delayed further work with the NSF on starting a dedicated Life Membership Fund. After much discussion, the EC will be recommending that the board amend Act 12-125 (Life Membership Fund) to allow investment in a low cost mutual fund until a formal contract with the NSF is approved. The proposed amendment and discussion points will be prepared and placed on the September agenda.
- 5. NCC at OTR: Simmons will transport the NCC tent. NCC members attending the event are urged to help setup and volunteer a few hours manning the display.
- 6. NCC at NRO: Simmons will contact NRO and VCA to get permission to conduct an auction.
- 7. Barn Dance: Arrangements are not yet completely locked in but some volunteers have come forward to help setup and tear down. Date appears to be September 30th pending confirmation from the band/caller. The EC is encouraging all board members to actively support the event either in person at the event, donating interesting items for the silent auction and/or by volunteering to help the Barn Dance Committee with the various tasks needed to make the evening a success.
- 8. Membership Events: Thacher Park would be a good location for a membership event in summer 2018. Board should discuss feasibility and interesting activities. The Thacher Event Center would be an ideal place to hold our 40th Anniversary Event in mid-October 2018. Simmons will discuss with Engel about availability and secure the date.
- 9. Liability Insurance: We have not received final bills for our new policies and the office will be closed for several weeks. The EC discussed strategies to monitor incoming mail for an invoice and get our payment in the return mail as quickly as possible.
- 10. Sharing Confidential Information: Berger attended the Conservancy's Round Table at convention and other conservancies were interested in what we learned and how we adapted to the recommendations of the legal reviews we commissioned. Kappler opined that we should share what we know with other conservancies. Others cautioned that Act 24-103 requires that proprietary legal advice should not be made public. The EC will be seeking guidance on how to respond to other conservancies asking for our help.

- 11. Web site: The new website is attractive but some outdated information and bad links have migrated from the previous site archives. So many glitches need attention that a suggestion was made that a work session may be in order.
